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Assessment Comparison Tool

Eduqas' GCSE English Language assessments provide learners with the opportunity to show that they can **understand** texts, and that they can **communicate effectively** for a given audience and purpose.

Our assessment of **Reading** requires comprehension and selection of relevant detail, while our assessment of Writing requires an appropriate choice of content shaped for its purpose. In both Reading and Writing, learners only need to write about or use 'techniques' where they are relevant and enhance their understanding or communication.
