In the following article, Catherine shares her insights on helping educators navigate their transition to Eduqas GCSE English Language.

Having transitioned from Head of Department to Regional Representative, I bring a unique perspective to supporting schools and colleges. My journey with Eduqas spans many years, both as an educator and now as someone dedicated to helping others discover what makes our qualifications special. Over the past decade, I have had the privilege of working with a diverse range of schools and colleges, guiding teaching teams through the switching process and beyond.

Building meaningful partnerships

Our team comprises subject specialists who understand the classroom experience. Many schools and colleges approach me through word-of-mouth recommendations from those who have benefited from our partnership approach, demonstrating the strength of relationships we build and maintain.

When the initial interest sparks, they seek to understand our unique proposition. I consistently share what resonates with our existing schools and colleges: personalised support from knowledgeable specialists, accessible assessment materials, and comprehensive FREE Digital Resources. For GCSE English Language, the accessibility of reading materials and question clarity proves the primary motivator for making the switch.

Every educational setting has distinct needs, and my approach reflects this diversity. Further education colleges often prioritise increasing Grade 4 pass rate, whilst some schools focus on strengthening performance at the highest achievement levels. Schools supporting learners with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) may explore how GCSE complements our Entry Level and Pathways qualifications.

My approach focuses on conversation rather than formal presentations, adapting to questions and concerns as they arise. Initial meetings begin with Eduqas' ethos and principles, contextualising our GCSE English Language qualification's purpose for learners' future prospects. Follow-up sessions address assessment approaches and marking philosophy, proving invaluable for educators given GCSE English Language marking complexities.

Ongoing support and development

The relationship extends well beyond initial switching. I facilitate networking between local schools and colleges, deliver refresher training during staff transitions, and provide targeted interventions where they require specific improvements.

My work with Consilium Academy Trust demonstrates this sustained approach. Following comprehensive switcher training across their Northwest and Northeast schools, I have delivered focused interventions: supporting Grade 4+ improvement through enhanced exam technique, addressing writing skills development, and implementing higherability learner strategies.

Our extensive resource bank enables me to curate materials that address specific requirements. I bring recent exam papers to every visit, whilst demonstrating our comprehensive online resources such as Narrative Writing materials, ensuring teachers and lecturers understand exactly what's available and how to access it effectively.

Professional Learning opportunities form a cornerstone of our support. I actively promote autumn face-to-face exam feedback sessions, which provide exceptional development opportunities with networking benefits. Additionally, I present an online November exam feedback session during the spring term, serving as timely preparation for the summer examination series.

The growing appeal of criminology

Preparing the next generation

As England's only exam board offering a Level 3 qualification in criminology, Eduqas has seen remarkable interest grow since its launch four years ago.

Our qualification enables students to explore pressing societal issues through a multidisciplinary lens - combining psychology, sociology, law and politics - whilst developing critical thinking skills about crime, justice and rehabilitation. With assessment balanced between examinations and coursework, the qualification makes criminology accessible to diverse learners, providing valuable pathways into higher education and careers in the criminal justice sector and beyond.



Topical, engaging and rigorous: students and teachers on the appeal of criminology

Not only is the subject stimulating for young minds enthralled by true crime content - ultimately, a qualification in criminology can lead to careers in the justice system, social and probation work, and more

When Jake Satchelle gets home from college each afternoon, his sister, 13, asks the same question: what did you learn today? The 17-year-old, from Horsham, West Sussex, is studying for a level 3 criminology qualification, where he learns about issues such as miscarriages of justice – and then shares his newfound knowledge with his younger sibling. "We're both obsessed with criminology, and she has the same drive that I have. It's really sweet," he says.

Satchelle is one of the first in his family to go into further education. He's taking A-levels in sociology, drama and theatre studies, but is particularly keen on level 3 criminology.

"There's a wealth of knowledge in criminology that can also be applied to real life, and it appeals to people who have a general interest in crime."

Others are equally enthusiastic. Jessica Ramsdall, 26, from Devon, says that she loved studying for her degree in criminology at Cardiff University, which she did having taken the subject at level 3.

She now works for a charity with survivors of sexual abuse, and will hear their experiences or look at why things happened, and much of it relates back to her studies. "I wouldn't be doing what I'm doing without it. I'd always recommend it."

Criminology touches on several academic disciplines, including politics, sociology, psychology and law. It explores the causes of crime, the impact it has, and how society can try to prevent it.

Eduqas is one of the largest providers of qualifications for schools, academies, sixth form and further education colleges across England. It is the only exam board in England to offer a level 3 qualification in criminology, which can be studied as a level 3 applied certificate in criminology and also a more in-depth level 3 applied diploma in criminology, which is worth up to 56 UCAS points. Students often follow the certificate in the first year before working towards the diploma in the second. The subject will continue to be funded for new starters until at least July 2027.



"It's very popular. We launched it four years ago, and it's gone from strength to strength," says Dr Matt Lamb, principal of Central Saint Michael's (CSM) sixth form in West Bromwich, which is part of Sandwell College, the largest provider of 16-19 study programmes in the West Midlands. Of the 900 pupils at CSM, 150 are studying criminology.

"They're learning why people commit crime, how the criminal justice system works, and about punishment versus rehabilitation. It's a really, really topical subject and students gain a unique perspective. They thoroughly enjoy it and the results here are really good."

Emma Edwards, an Eduqas criminology Subject Officer, agrees. She says 16-19 year olds are "fascinated" by it, and it's become really popular. "It's unique. They can study sociology, psychology or law and there are elements of criminology in there, but this is a distinct academic discipline that really does tap into something with young people. It leads many of them to go on to higher education."

One reason for its popularity is that the course allows students to discuss contemporary issues, she says. "It's so pertinent. They get to assess whether formal punishments actually meet their aims, and it's so topical after the crisis of overcrowding in prisons and the early release of prisoners."

Often studied alongside A-levels, what sets it apart is the way it is assessed: 50% through exams and 50% non-examined assessment. Lamb says this change in emphasis appeals to a wider range of students.

Some CSM pupils live in the borough of Sandwell, one of the most deprived areas in the country, with low progression to higher education, says Lamb. He believes the level 3 in criminology is a rigorous qualification while also being a "more accessible qualification for more marginal students, or for those for whom exams may be less suitable. A-levels, with their stress on 100% exams in a lot of subjects, preclude some learners who may have the potential for university but whose learning styles means that they are less suited for exams."

For Satchelle, one of the "massive benefits" of the Eduqas level 3 qualification is the way it is tested. There are four units that are assessed across the two years rather than in a single final exam.

Although its popularity is in part down to the current appetite for crime dramas and podcasts, the qualification can pave the way to higher education and, ultimately, graduate careers in the criminal justice sector, social and probation work, as well as sociology and psychology. At CSM, students have gone on to become solicitors, barristers or employed by the probation service. "They're learning real-world transferable skills that are useful in youth work, social work, teaching and a wide range of jobs," says Lamb.

Other associated fields are policing and forensics. "We have a lot of criminology students in Kent and a lot of them have gone on to work for Border Force, for example," says Edwards. "It's very appealing and these are areas where we really do need people."

Satchelle, too, seems to have it all mapped out. His long-term plan is to do a police constable degree apprenticeship. "This will allow me to get paid while I'm on the job and experience first-hand the effects that crime can have on our society rather than just hearing about it in the news or in a documentary," he says. "I really am passionate about it."

Voices from the educational frontline

The involvement of Eduqas' Regional Representative, Catherine Oldham, has had a significant impact on the delivery of our GCSE English Language retake programme. Her guidance has ensured our teaching methods and assessment strategies are fully aligned with current exam board standards, leading to greater consistency and clarity in lesson planning.

Staff have benefited from up-to-date training and insights, boosting confidence in delivering targeted support, while learners are better prepared and more focused, with a clearer understanding of exam expectations. This collaboration has strengthened our overall approach, ultimately improving learners' outcomes.





Strategic engagement

Beyond individual institutions, we have actively participated in sector-wide initiatives that brought together diverse stakeholders from across the education landscape.

These engagements included strategic forums with the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ), Ofqual, Department for Education (DfE), and Skills England.

Nurturing a culture of environmental awareness

As an organisation, we recognise the carbon footprint associated with our activities. This is why we are actively implementing new initiatives that not only reduce our overall environmental impact but foster a sustainable culture among our people.

Our journey towards Net Zero

The creation of environmental monitoring dashboards for our Western Avenue and Treforest sites marks a significant milestone in our sustainability journey.

These monitoring systems provide detailed visibility into our direct and indirect emissions and purchased energy, guiding our strategic path towards Net Zero by 2032.

Green Champions: Empowering environmental leadership

Our Green Champions Programme continues to strengthen, with 13 Environmental Champions currently undertaking our Sustainability qualification (pictured below). This initiative provides our team with foundational knowledge in sustainability, enabling them to expand their expertise through a recognised qualification.

Our Champions serve as internal advocates, implementing best practices and inspiring colleagues to embrace more sustainable behaviours across our operations. They also actively seek and suggest innovative sustainability ideas for Eduqas to review and take forward, creating a valuable pipeline of environmental initiatives





Reduction of gas usage at our Treforest site by approximately 64,000 kWh through heating electrification - enough energy to heat 6 average UK schools for an entire winter - representing a 45% decrease from our 2018/19 baseline.



Our electrical energy efficiency has improved by 33%, from printing 56 to 74 A3 sheets of paper/kWh of electricity — reducing our electricity consumption by 25% for every exam paper we produce, enough saved electricity to power computer suites in 20 schools for a full academic year.



A substantial £300,000 investment in intelligent lighting systems across both our sites.

Key progress areas

Our sustainability initiatives continue to deliver meaningful results across multiple areas of our operations. Highlights include:

Renewable energy

We're proud to announce significant investments in on-site renewable energy generation, adding to our existing sustainability initiatives. Our Western Avenue site will soon feature a solar panel installation, representing a £98,000 investment in our clean energy future. The project will install 201 solar panels, generating 86 MWh of electricity annually - enough to power computers in 430 classrooms all year-round - while delivering CO2e savings of 17 tonnes per year, equivalent to taking 835 school bus journeys off the road.

Waste reduction

Our commitment to reducing waste has led to an innovative partnership with Manetti, which is focused on addressing the environmental impact of plastic bags used for exam papers. During 2024-25, we recycled almost 1 tonne of plastic through this programme — equivalent to 89,000 sandwich bags, enough to pack school lunches for nearly 500 learners for an entire academic year.

Supplier engagement

Recognising that our environmental footprint extends well beyond our direct operations, we have intensified engagement with our major suppliers regarding sustainable practices. This strategic dialogue focuses on understanding their emissions profiles, obtaining more accurate environmental data, and collaboratively identifying more sustainable alternatives for our supply chain.

Since joining Eduqas, I've been impressed by the organisation's proactive approach to sustainability. Our significant investments in reducing the carbon footprint of our facilities, combined with comprehensive emissions work with suppliers, demonstrate real commitment to environmental responsibility.

From Director-level initiatives to our voluntary Green Champions driving shop-floor improvements, sustainability passion is evident throughout the organisation. It's exciting to be part of a company with such a clear environmental direction.
